VOCABULARY LEARNING TECHNIQUES

Building vocabulary does not require extraordinary intelligence. It requires consistency, curiosity and the right approach. The following techniques can help students learn and retain words effectively.

1. Learn Words Daily

Vocabulary growth is a gradual process. Learning five to ten new words every day can lead to remarkable improvement over time.

For example:

10 words per day × 365 days = 3,650 new words in one year

Small daily efforts create significant long-term results.

2. Maintain a Vocabulary Notebook

A dedicated vocabulary notebook is one of the most effective learning tools.

For each word, record:

Word → Meaning → Synonyms → Antonyms → Part of Speech → Example Sentence

Example:

- Word: Benevolent
- Meaning: Kind and generous
- Synonym: Compassionate
- Antonym: Cruel
- Sentence: The benevolent officer helped the villagers during the flood.

Regular revision of such notes greatly improves retention.

3. Learn Through Root Words

Many English words originate from common roots. Understanding roots enables learners to guess the meanings of unfamiliar words.

Example:

- Root: "bio" = life
- Biology = Study of life
- Biography = Life story
- Biodegradable = Capable of being broken down naturally

Learning roots allows students to understand hundreds of related words efficiently.

4. Study Prefixes and Suffixes

Prefixes and suffixes provide valuable clues about word meanings.

Examples:

- Prefix: Un- = Not
- Happy → Unhappy
- Prefix: Re- = Again
- Write → Rewrite
- Suffix: -ful = Full of
- Beauty → Beautiful

Knowledge of word formation accelerates vocabulary acquisition.

5. Use Words in Sentences

Words learned in isolation are easily forgotten. Using them in sentences strengthens memory.

Example:

- Word: Vigilant
- Sentence: The vigilant guard noticed suspicious activity near the gate.
- Active usage transforms passive knowledge into permanent learning.

6. Revise Frequently

Revision is the key to retention.

A useful revision schedule:

- Review after 1 day.
- Review after 1 week.
- Review after 1 month.

Repeated exposure ensures that words remain in long-term memory.

7. Contextual Learning Method

Contextual learning means understanding a word through the situation or sentence in which it is used rather than memorizing its dictionary meaning alone. This method is highly effective because the human brain remembers stories, situations and associations better than isolated facts.

Consider the sentence:

The exhausted climber finally reached the summit after a strenuous journey.

Even if the word “strenuous” is unfamiliar, the surrounding words suggest that it means “difficult” or “requiring great effort.” This ability to infer meaning from context is extremely useful in competitive examinations.
